Providing a real insight into the power of money and tradition within the aristocracy, it's a confident, gripping debut.

by Heidi Swain (£7.99, PB, Simon & Schuster) Poppy is moving into her dream cottage in Nightingale Square and is looking forward to starting a new life



among neighbours and friends, working on the community garden and indulging her passion for cooking. But will her happiness be threatened by the arrival of a grumpy new neighbour and Poppy's troublesome brother, Ryan? As the go-to author for a heart-warming story, Swain delivers again with a cast of charming characters.

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The Gift of Friends by Emma Hannigan (£7.99, PB, Headline)

It's shocking and saddening to realise that the author of this uplifting tale passed

away last year, only days after finishing her final novel. It's a wise, witty and life-affirming story about women who face a whole heap of troubles, but know that by turning to each other for support, they can get through anything. A beautiful summer read.
